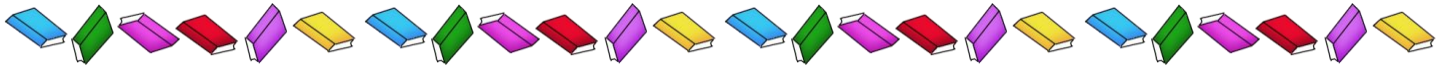


# Directions for Summer Reading BINGO



**Directions:** Your goal is to complete (5) activities in a row to make a BINGO. The more BINGO cards you complete and turn in on the first day of school, the more opportunities you will have to win a prize!

To be eligible for the Summer Reading BINGO raffle you must complete and turn in your BINGO card to your new teacher on Monday, August 12, which is the first day of school. If you complete the reading activities to make a BINGO, you will submit the activities with your BINGO card to your teacher, too.

**Activity #1:** Trading Card: Create a trading card on a character, place, or event in a book you have read. Go to: [http://www.readwritethink.org/files/resources/interactives/trading\\_cards\\_2](http://www.readwritethink.org/files/resources/interactives/trading_cards_2) Follow directions to create your trading card, print it out, and return it with your BINGO card on the first day of school.

**Activity #2:** Summary: Create a comic strip of the main events that happened in a book you have read. Be sure to draw speech balloons to accompany each picture with dialog from the character(s). You can create your own comic strip style or use the template at: [www.k12reader.com/comic-strip-templates-5-designs/view/](http://www.k12reader.com/comic-strip-templates-5-designs/view/) Print out or save the drawing of your comic strip and return with your BINGO card on the first day of school.

**Activity #3:** Characters: Create a small "Most Wanted" poster (8.5 x 11) of the meanest character in a book you have read. Remember to include a drawing or print out of the character, descriptive words of what he/she looks like, and why he/she is wanted. Save the "Most Wanted" poster and return it with your BINGO card on the first day of school.

**Activity #4:** Becoming the Author: Pretend you are the author of the book you read. In a paragraph, explain what you would change in the book; whether it be the ending, setting, characters, or events that happened and why those particular things needed to be changed. Save your paragraph and return it with your BINGO card on the first day of school.

**Activity #5:** Timeline: Create a timeline of the sequential events that happened in the book you read. The timeline can be organized by time of day, date, or event. Go to: [http://www.readwritethink.org/files/resources/interactives/timeline\\_2/](http://www.readwritethink.org/files/resources/interactives/timeline_2/) Please save and print your timeline and return it with your BINGO card on the first day of school.

## Year-at-a-Glance Pacing Guide

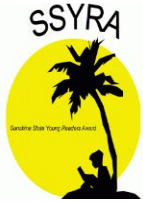


Students and parents can look at what they will be learning in the next grade by using this resource. The standards have learning links, activities, and resources aligned to them.

The **Year-at-a-Glance** (YAG) is a document that informs parents and students of the recommended pacing and content standards for selected courses. It includes the topics to be taught week by week each quarter and a list of instructional resources. The YAG is only a recommended pacing guide; school leaders and teachers make the final decision regarding the pacing of any program of study. The classroom teacher is always the best source of information regarding content and pacing. The YAG is supplied as a model of one recommended path to the completion of a course.

## Grades 3-5 Sunshine State Books



The Sunshine State Young Readers Award (SSYRA) Program is a statewide reading motivational program for students in grades 3 through 8. The purpose of the SSYRA Program is to encourage students to read independently for pleasure and to read books that are on, above, and below their reading level in order to improve their reading fluency. Students who read a SSYRA book and pass the quiz with 70% or higher will receive a brag tag for each book read and will be eligible for various incentives including Otter Box goodies and school-wide recognition. All students who read at least three SSYRA Jr. books are eligible to vote on their favorite as part of the statewide vote.

Students who read SSYRA Jr. books will receive a brag tag in three book increments and will be eligible for various incentives including Otter Box goodies and school-wide recognition. All students who read at least three SSYRA Jr. books are eligible to vote on their favorite as part of the statewide vote.

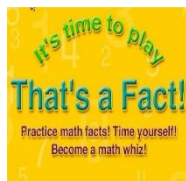
