Dear Ocean Palms Families,

No, we're not talking about the lottery, we are referencing the number of words a student will be exposed to in one school year if they read just 20 minutes a day. By reading 20 minutes a day your child will hear 1.8 million words in one year, they will have read 851 hours by 6<sup>th</sup> grade and they will likely score better than 90% of their peers on tests.



Certainly we know reading helps students develop vocabulary for fluency and comprehension but it also helps them communicate their thoughts clearer and improves their writing skills. Reading also builds empathy, lengthens attention span, inspires creativity, and sparks curiosity. It is easy to see that reading has TONS of benefits!

Please consider joining us for the "Go for 20" Reading Challenge during the month of April. Simply initial the calendar (found on page 4) for each day your child reads 20 minutes at home. Turn in your initialed calendar to your child's teacher by Wednesday, April 28. 



# Outstanding Youth Volunteer of the Year

Collaboration was also made with science teachers, ensuring the lesson plans developed and taught aligned with each grade level's standards and rigor. Thoughtful and innovative hands-on lessons were created allowing students to explore science authentically while simultaneously increasing engagement and interest in the scientific fields. Ocean Palms' students across all grade levels developed increased problem solving and critical thinking skills, while gaining exposure to reactions, materials and equipment in a lab setting. Early exposure to these skills will serve our students well as they advance through middle and high school.

Dr. Miller has an unparalleled passion and zeal for increased STEM education. She thinks and acts like a well-versed teacher, while rallying funds to purchase supplies for her beloved Science Lab. Hands-on experiences significantly advance learning at all levels of science education when designed and guided by qualified educators, and Dr. Miller is just that educator. Computer-simulated activities may increase exposure of science to our elementary students, but they cannot be considered as equal replacements for the hands-on guided Science Lab experience provided by Dr. Miller, Dr. Aragon and our dedicated Science Lab.



# Outstanding Senior Volunteer of the Year

## Mr. Mark C. Tolton

Ocean Palms is proud to name Mark C. Tolton as our Outstanding Senior Volunteer of the Year. One has only to experience Mr. Tolton's innate kindness of spirit when he served our Pre-K classrooms to understand why our Pre-K teachers glowed in their description of him. They still use the word "magical" as these students adored him and developed a strong connection with him. He had a calming effect, remaining exceedingly kind and patient. Mr. Tolton always entered the classroom with a smile, personally greeting all students. One teacher described it as "He brought a sense of peace with him" that exuded throughout the classroom.



Mr. Tolton started as a qualified tutor, but he quickly became more. He worked one-on-one with students on numbers, colors and letters during independent morning work, as well as "playing" with the students in choice centers and out at recess. This specialized tutoring during independent morning work strengthened each child's abilities. Moreover, Mr. Tolton focused on repetition, which provides the practice children need to master new skills. Repetition improves speed, increases confidence and strengthens the connections in the brain that help children learn.

Beyond his tutoring time, Mr. Tolton would *always* stay to assist students who needed help during lunch, while role modeling etiquette and good manners for them. It was the simplest of kindnesses that captured the hearts of not only our students, but our teachers. Mr. Tolton made our Pre-K classrooms multi-generational and was the adopted "grandfather" of the class. He was a constant and reliable presence. To work with our Pre-K students requires a dedication and empathy that cannot be taught, and no amount of training could have brought Ocean Palms a volunteer equal to our dynamic Mr. Tolton. Mr. Tolton's contribution to our Pre-K students remains immeasurable.



# Spring Testing is Approaching

What an unprecedented and unique year! Parents, your children have shown resilience and perseverance during the school closures of last spring and the reopening this year. To say we're in awe of your children is an understatement! We are proud that we get to work with such amazing kids each and every day. With Spring testing approaching, it can be a time of anxiousness, but we implore you to have conversations with your children as this is a great opportunity to see their growth in learning. Thank you for encouraging him or her to do his or her best. We look forward to seeing the academic growth of our OPE students this spring.

## **Florida Statewide Assessments (FSA)**

While there are many details that have not yet been released from the state, we would like to update all families on the information we do have to share. All students in 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, and 5<sup>th</sup> grades will participate in the Florida Statewide Assessment Program. When specific dates have been released, your child(ren)'s classroom teacher will share pertinent testing information with you. Florida Department of Education does not allow districts to provide a virtual testing option for the Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) for the 2020-2021 school year. According to the state Department of Education, "We are not considering remote proctoring or at-home testing for any of Florida's K-12 summative or postsecondary assessments in 2020-21".

# **Florida Statewide Assessments (FSA)**

If you would like to review the materials, paper-based practice tests and answer keys are available at <http://www.FSAssessments.org/students-and-families/practice-tests/paper-based-practice-test-materials/>. For information regarding test session lengths for all Spring 2021 FSA assessments, please visit the FSA Portal at [www.FSAssessments.org](http://www.FSAssessments.org), click on the Students and Families icon, select the Frequently Asked Questions card, then select the question: "How long are the tests?" **Please review the following policies with your child(ren) before FSA.**

**Electronic Devices** - Students are not permitted to have any electronic devices, including, but not limited to, cell phones, smartphones, and smartwatches, at any time during testing or during breaks (e.g., restroom), even if the devices are turned off or students do not use them. If your student is found with an electronic device, his or her test will be invalidated. Calculators are not permitted during Mathematics tests.

**Testing Rules Acknowledgment** - All FSA tests include a Testing Rules Acknowledgment printed in the student's test and answer book that reads: "I understand the testing rules that were just read to me. If I do not follow these rules, my test score may be invalidated." Prior to testing, test administrators read the rules to students, and students acknowledge that they understand the testing rules by signing below the statement in their test and answer book.

**Discussing Test Content after Testing** - The last portion of the testing rules read to students before they sign below the Testing Rules Acknowledgment states: "Because the content in all statewide assessments is secure, you may not discuss or reveal details about the test content (including test items, passages, and prompts) after the test. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as texting, emailing, or posting online, for example, on Facebook, Twitter, Snapchat, or Instagram." Please make sure your student understands that "discussing" test content includes any kind of electronic communication, such as texting, emailing, posting to social media, or sharing online. While students may not share information about secure test content after testing, this policy is not intended to prevent students from discussing their testing experiences with their parents/families.

**Working Independently** - Students are responsible for doing their own work during the test and for protecting their answers from being seen by others. If students are caught cheating during testing, their tests will be invalidated. In addition, the Florida Department of Education (FDOE) employs Caveon Test Security to analyze student test results to detect unusually similar answer patterns. Student tests within a school that are found to have extremely similar answer patterns will be invalidated.

**Leaving Campus** - If your child leaves campus before completing a test session (e.g., for lunch, an appointment, illness), he or she will not be allowed to return to that test session. If your student does not feel well on the day of testing, it may be best for him or her to wait and be tested on a make-up day. Please remember not to schedule appointments on testing days.

**Testing Accommodations** - If your child has an Individual Education Plan (IEP), a Section 504 plan, or is an English Language Learner (ELL), please contact the school to discuss the testing accommodations that will be provided for your child.

## COVID-19 FAQ Regarding Quarantined Close Contacts

The CDC has released new guidelines regarding quarantine time frames for **asymptomatic close contacts**. Although 14 days is considered the gold standard, there are options for close contacts to end quarantine earlier than 14 days.

### What are the current options to reduce the quarantine time for my student?

- **Option 1: NO TESTING - 10 day quarantine**

If asymptomatic, end quarantine after completion of day 10 and return to school on day 11.

- **Option 2: PCR TEST on Day 6 or later**

If an asymptomatic close contact gets tested by polymerase chain reaction (PCR) test on DAY 6 or later and receives a negative result, **he/she may end quarantine and return to school after completion of day 7.**

**\*Note: The PCR test is different from the rapid antigen test. PCR test results are averaging 3-5 days.**

### Where is PCR testing available?

- Please visit the [clinic website https://www-ope.stjohns.k12.fl.us/clinic/](https://www-ope.stjohns.k12.fl.us/clinic/) for a list of testing locations.
- **Make sure results can be provided within 24 to 48 hours.** If the results are likely to take longer than 48 hours, it may be better to quarantine through day 10 and return to school on day 11, if no symptoms.
- **CHILDREN WITH A KNOWN PENDING TEST RESULT SHOULD NOT RETURN TO SCHOOL**

### If my student has a negative PCR test result, obtained on or after day 6 following exposure, what is the next step?

Call the St. Johns County Department of Health at (904) 506-6081 to check if the result has been reported electronically to them. If the result is reported, the Department of Health (DOH) will call the school to clear your student to return, assuming your student is asymptomatic.

**If you were notified of a negative result, but it is not reflected in the DOH system, a copy of the result must be provided directly to the Health Department. The school nurse will not accept copies of negative PCR lab results as clearance to return.**

Clearance to return to school can only be done by the DOH.

STUDENT SYMPTOM CRITERIA CHECKLIST**

Due to the nature of communicable illnesses and during this time of COVID-19 Pandemic, in addition to symptoms of commonly occurring illnesses, any student presenting with the following symptoms will be sent to the school nurse for assessment. Parents will be contacted regarding student pick-up.

Symptom criteria from the Florida Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics states students who meet the screening criteria below should be sent home for further medical evaluation.

**TWO OR MORE OF THE FOLLOWING:**

- Chills
- Muscle aches
- Headache
- Sore throat
- New decrease in smell or taste
- Vomiting and/or diarrhea

**OR ONE OF THE FOLLOWING:**

- Fever of 100.4 or higher
- Uncontrolled cough
- Shortness of breath

**Your child must be evaluated by a healthcare provider and must present a clearance note to return to school. Contact your healthcare provider or the Department of Health regarding your child's symptoms.**

Per CDC and AAP guidelines, if your child is not medically evaluated, he/she must remain at home for at least 10 days from the first day symptoms appeared AND 24 hours fever free without fever-reducing medications AND improvement of symptoms.

If you decide to not have your child medically evaluated and choose to keep him/her home for the 10 day recommendation, you must send a written note stating such with your child upon their return to school.

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

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
