It is hard to believe, but the fourth quarter is here. During the last nine weeks of school, teachers in grades (K - 4) will schedule parent-teacher conferences to discuss your child's progress and complete a classroom placement card. The placement card is the parents' opportunity to give input on class placement for next school year. Please know that we do not take requests for specific teachers. Any students' needs or desired teacher characteristics should be outlined on the placement card.

During the fourth quarter students will take their final state assessment. The Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) is the state required progress monitoring tool that is administered three times per year to track your student's progress in learning the Benchmarks of Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.). The assessment window for students in grades (K-2) opens for Reading and Math on April 17th and the window for grades (3-5) opens on May 1st. We are currently in the process of finalizing our assessment calendar. Once dates are locked in your child's homeroom teacher will be able to share their exact testing dates. Third and fourth grade students will assess both Reading and Math this year while Fifth grade students will take Reading, Math, and Science. The 2023 school year is a calibration year and OPE was not selected as a site location for the fourth and fifth grade writing assessment.

We strongly encourage everyone to visit **Students & Families**(fifast.org) for detailed information about the state required assessments your child is taking on the computer and to sign up for the Family Portal **Login**(cambiumast.com) to have direct access to your child's assessment results.



Lastly, it is bittersweet to share news that Assistant Principal, Dr. Johnson is pursuing a position in higher education. Dr. Johnson taught at OPE before moving into his administrative role and built lasting relationships with staff and OPE families. While we are saddened by his departure we wish him the very best! Dr. Johnson's last day was March 10.

THIRD GRADE PROGRESSION STATUE



The third grade progression statute is to ensure that students have the necessary reading skills to be successful in grade 4 and beyond, where the rigors of reading in the content areas increase. According to section 1008.25 (5), Florida Statutes (F.S.), to be promoted to fourth grade, a third-grade student must score a Level 2 or above on the statewide Florida Assessment of Student Thinking – English Language Arts (FAST-ELA). The fol-

lowing plan describes several ways for students who do not meet this standard initially to be promoted to fourth grade.

If a student does not demonstrate proficiency on the statewide FAST- ELA Assessment during the third progress monitoring (PM3) test, they may attend the district provided Summer Reading Program to ensure they receive additional instruction.

There is also statutory language that prohibits the statewide FAST- ELA from being the sole determiner of promotion and states that additional evaluations, portfolio reviews and assessments are available to the child to assist parents and the school district in knowing when a child is reading at or above grade level and ready for grade promotion. Students are scheduled to take the Spring ELA Assessment between May 1st – 25th. OPE's administrative staff will contact the parents of any students who score a level 1 as soon as results are released to the school to discuss next steps.

Our district's Student Progression Plan requires students in grade 3 who score Level 1 on FAST to attend the Summer Reading Program unless they qualify for promotion by good cause exemption 2 or 3. All good cause exemptions are posted on the next page.

Third Grade Good Cause Exemptions

Good Cause Exemptions 1, 4, 5, 6 Students who earn a Level 1 on the FAST for PM3 and meet one of the Good Cause Exemptions outlined below must also attend the 2023 Summer Reading Program. A student only needs to meet the criteria for one of the 6 Good Cause Exemptions.

Good Cause Exemption #1: Limited English proficient students who have had less than two (2) years of instruction in an English for Speakers of Other Languages program based on the initial date of entry into a school in the United States.

Good Cause Exemption #2: Students with disabilities whose individual education plan indicates that participation in the statewide assessment program is not appropriate, consistent with requirements of s.1008.212, *F.S.*

Good Cause Exemption #3: Students who demonstrate an acceptable level of performance on an alternate standardized reading or English Language Arts assessment approved by the State Board of Education. Alternate Assessments: SAT-10, raw score 37 (45th percentile) or STAR Reading 986 scale score (50th percentile).

STAR Enterprise Reading (given as first alternate assessment)

May 15th – May 25th

SAT-10 (Student can take the SAT-10 a total of two times)

- May 18th May 25th
- July 10th July 13th

Good Cause Exemption #4: A student who demonstrates through a student portfolio that he or she is performing at least at Level 2 on the statewide, standardized English Language Arts assessment.

Good Cause Exemption #5: Students with disabilities who take the statewide, standardized English Language Arts assessment and who have an individual education plan or a Section 504 Plan that reflects that the student has received intensive remediation in reading or English Language Arts for more than two years but still demonstrates a deficiency and was previously retained in kindergarten, grade 1, grade 2 or grade 3.

Good Cause Exemption #6: Students who have received intensive reading intervention for two or more years but still demonstrate a deficiency in reading and who were previously retained in kindergarten, grade 1, grade 2, or grade 3 for a total of two years. A student may not be retained more than once in grade 3.

F.A.S.T Assessment Grades (3-5) Only

(3-5) Achievement Levels for the 2022-23 school year only, are provisional and are linked to the 2021-22 reporting scale as required by Florida Law.

For 2023-2024 and beyond, scores will be reported on a new scale after the State Board of Education adopts new student achievement expectations in fall of 2023.

Level 1 (257-303):

Inadequate: Students who score in Level 1 demonstrate an inadequate level of mastery of the B.E.S.T. Standards for their grade. To be prepared for the next grade, they are highly likely to need substantial support.

Level 2 (304-320):

Below Satisfactory: Students who score in Level 2 demonstrate a below satisfactory level of mastery of the B.E.S.T. Standards for their grade. To be prepared for the next grade, they are likely to need substantial support.

Level 3 (321-335):

On-Grade-Level: Students who score in Level 3 demonstrate on-grade-level mastery of the B.E.S.T. Standards for their grade. They may need additional support to excel in the next grade.

Level 4 (336-351):

Proficient: Students who score in Level 4 demonstrate proficiency in the B.E.S.T. Standards for their grade. They are likely to excel in the next grade.

Level 5 (352-385):

Mastery: Students who score in Level 5 demonstrate mastery of the B.E.S.T. Standards for their grade. They are highly likely to excel in the next

Senior Volunteer of the Year 22-23 Mrs. Sharon Kehoe

Ocean Palms Elementary School is proud to celebrate its own personal crusader against childhood hunger: **Mrs. Sharon Kehoe.** Mrs. Kehoe is the coordinator of the local Blessings in a Backpack project. Blessings in a Backpack is a national nonprofit program that gives food security to at-risk children on the weekends. However, this program is 100% funded through donations and volunteers. Without Mrs. Kehoe, this program would cease to exist in our community, and many children would suffer serious consequences from such a loss.



Mrs. Kehoe is the OPE 22-23 Senior Volunteer of the Year.

Without fail for **13 years**, this remarkable woman has planned meals, organized volunteer teams and work locations, fundraised purchases, and delivered food backpacks to **195 students** in need at local schools. Currently, Mrs. Kehoe logs about **6-10 hours weekly** on this project alone. Other schools that have benefitted from Mrs. Kehoe's attention include: Landrum Middle School, Palm Valley Academy, Valley Ridge, and PVPV/Rawlings.

Mrs. Kehoe, a former pediatric nurse and senior health executive by way of Buffalo, New York, is unstoppable in her life's work! During the Covid-19 restrictions, she could not assemble volunteers to help with Blessings in a Backpack. Therefore, she and her husband, Mr. Ken Kehoe, singlehandedly kept the program up and running. Her selfless dedication, to include a willingness to plan family time and vacations around her Blessings in the Backpack school year schedule, is extraordinary. The short and long-term impacts of Mrs. Kehoe's contributions on SJCSD students' socio-emotional health and physical wellbeing are immeasurable!

What fuels Mrs. Kehoe's commitment and passion for the underprivileged long into her retirement is the deep, abiding belief that childhood hunger needs to be eliminated. On many occasions, Mrs. Kehoe has been heard motivating volunteers with the poignant words: "Kids don't choose to be hungry." This beautiful, caring wife to Ken is also the loving mother of five children and grandmother to eight grandchildren. Her family remarked that her entire life has been about volunteering and service to others. They said, "Whether it be children, women, impoverished, or anyone who just needs a helping hand, she does so unconditionally and without a second thought." Ocean Palms Elementary is honored to have a person as rare as Mrs. Kehoe in our midst. Her lifelong call to duty and unparalleled acts of kindness are a legacy for others to strive for and follow.

Adult Volunteer of the Year 22-23 Mrs. Jennifer Werba

Ocean Palms Elementary School is proud to announce Mrs. Jennifer Werba as our Outstanding Adult Volunteer of the Year. Generous with her time and expertise, Mrs. Werba has served OPE for over eight years in variety of volunteer positions including School Advisory Committee, Spring Family Night Co-Chair, New Playground Co-Chair, TFW Workout Chair, Otterpalooza Helper, Pavers Chair, and Fifth Grade Celebration Chair. She has also donated hours to test proctoring, books fairs, room parent activities, STEM nights, Otter Runs, and teacher appreciation events. From August 2021 to now, she has logged well over 150 hours of volunteer time.



Two years ago, Mrs. Werba assumed the leadership role of **OPE PTO President**. She has dedicated much time and effort toward the viability and mission of this critical school-support organization, especially school and community relations. During her tenure, the PTO made substantial membership and financial gains that have benefitted all OPE stakeholders. Currently, the PTO has over 300 members and 33 business partners. Additionally, this year, the PTO added more faculty members to its membership roster than any other year in OPE history. However, it is Mrs. Werba's humility that endears her most to the OPE family. Mrs. Werba believes strongly in the process of collectively putting together a diverse group of people to collaborate and work for common causes. She reaches out to new OPE families and makes all feel welcomed and valued. Along with her outstanding PTO board, she has worked tirelessly at identifying the everyday needs of OPE teachers and students as she maintains that "a lot of little projects made a big difference." One of the little projects that made a big difference was the delivery of printers to every teacher's classroom in September 2022. Some additional projects include the purchase of 80 laptops/4 carts, printer toner, picnic tables, kindergarten bench, field striper, breakaway bases, PE Cart with supplies for Teacher Led PE, fan misters, umbrellas for staff car line duty, staff holiday gift cards, additional Otter Rock, STEM equipment, and tents for outdoor events.

Ocean Palms Elementary School owes its greatest debt of gratitude to Mrs. Werba and PTO members for the playground renovation project, a costly campus improvement project that has taken about 4 years to initiate and complete in two phrases. During Phase 1, they replaced the old Pirate Ship playground structure that was approximately 17 years old and had significant maintenance challenges. Mrs. Werba and Mrs. Stacy Rendzio pursued several sponsorships to help off-set the \$140,000 cost. Then they negotiated with the vendor to lower the cost of the install. Determined to move forward for the benefit of OPE children, they installed the new structure in the summer of 2020— during the slow-down of the pandemic! What makes this project so special is they build a robust playground that all children can play on. By installing a ramp, sensory pieces along the ramp, and the Rocking Otter Float, every child can enjoy the playground. Phase 2, financed with allocated funds from the fall OPE Otter Run and designed by PTO members Sierra Boyce and Caryn Drew, was installed at the end of February 2023. Phrase 2 included replacement of the 3-slide playground structure that is 26 years old. The new structure has 3 double swings and new rubber mulch. Lastly, Mrs. Werba's congeniality and gifts extend outside the OPE family footprint. In addition to caring deeply for her Ponte Vedra Beach community, this Atlanta, Georgia native is a loving wife to and mother to three children: Jake, Juliette, and John Edward. She is a member of the Sawgrass Country Club and is involved in youth and adult tennis leagues.

Youth Volunteer of the Year 22-23 Miss Serenity (Evie) Smith



While many other middle schoolers are charging home as soon as the LMS bell rings, **Miss Serenity (Evie) Smith** is working hard in the 100 Hallway of Ocean Palms Elementary School. Her frequent and loving dedication to the OPE kindergarten teachers and students have caused her to be nominated as the **OPE Youth Volunteer of the Year.**





To register for a Home Access Center Account, "HAC", please follow the below instructions. Please note, only the **Parent or Legal Guardian** of the student can register for a HAC account and the student must be in compliance with Immunizations and Registration requirements as per District Policy. Only one account is needed per family.

Navigate to the St. Johns County School District website at http://www.stjohns.k12.fl.us/. Across the top of the homepage, you will see the HAC Icon. Click to enter HAC.



On this page you will find an overview of the Home Access Center, FAQ's and the log in prompt. To login, click the blue "Login to Home Access Center" box.



If you already have an account, you can log in using your user name and password. If you need to register for a HAC account, "Click here to register for HAC".

Fill in all fields completely:

The St. Johns County School District (SJCSD) has recently implemented the eSchoolPLUS Family Mobile App for parents/guardians. This mobile app allows parents to see many of the Home Access Center (HAC) features from their mobile phone. This application uses the same login credentials as Home Access Center (HAC).

Here is what the eSchoolPlus Family applooks like in the app store (Apple or Google):



Here are some of the key academic areas displayed by this mobile app:

- Student grades
- Attendance
- Assignments
- Report Card and Progress Reports
- Schedule
- Transportation
- Notifications

In addition, we discovered that some parents were using other untrusted 3rd party mobile apps to provide similar data pulled from our system by providing them with their personal HAC credentials. This can be dangerous because, the District has no connection or affiliation with these other vendor apps. By providing them with your credentials, you have granted them access to your child's personal academic data. If this is the case, we recommend you remove the 3rd party app from your phone and then change your password in HAC. Then download and use the new eSchoolPLUS Family app (shown above).

School Messenger

School Messenger is a rapid phone, text, and/or email notification system provided by our school district to communicate information efficiently. This system will be used for providing information to parents and guardians about safety, attendance, and school events. Please visit https://www.stjohns.k12.fl.us/schoolmessenger/ for detailed information.

How to Opt-in or Opt-out of SchoolMessenger Text Messages

The first step of the process was conducted on 1/4/17 when the District sent an opt-in text message to all parent/guardian and staff phone numbers on file. If you received the opt-in message on your mobile device and responded with a "Y" or "Yes", you should have received a confirmation text message stating, "You're registered 4 SchoolMessenger notifications". No further action is required for you to receive future text messages from your child's school or from the District.

If you **did not** receive the opt-in message on your mobile device and want to receive text messages from your child's school or from the District please follow the steps below:

- From your mobile device, Text "Yes" to 67587. You should then receive a response text message stating, "You're registered 4 SchoolMessenger notifications".
- Now that you have registered your device to receive text messages, you must verify that your mobile device phone number(s) is on file at your child's school.
 - · You can verify that your contact phone numbers are up to date by viewing them in SchoolMessenger InfoCenter.
 - . If you need to make changes to the phone numbers listed, please contact your child's school.

If you wish to opt-out of text messaging, simply text "Stop" to 67587.

Accessing Student Score Reports in HAC - Grades 3-10 FAST Testing

Florida statute 1008.25 requires that test results must be provided to *parents* within two weeks of their student's test attempt.


For the first progress monitoring window (PM1), the statewide Family Portal is not equipped to provide the score information within the required reporting timeline.

To comply with state statute, parents will be given online access to their student's individual score reports in Home Access Center (HAC). We ask that schools inform parents of this process and provide parents/guardians the directions to access the results online (directions below).

Parents/Guardians will login to Home Access Center (https://homeaccess.stjohns.k12.fl.us/HomeAccess)

- 1. Navigate to the "Home" screen
- 2. Click on the "Student Attachments" tab

A list of available score reports will be displayed. Users will click on the report they would like to view and the file will download as a pdf.

How can I access the Family Portal?

What information do I need to log in to the Family Portal?

- Your student's unique 6 digit access code (found in HACunder the Registrationtab).
- Your student's date of birth.
- Your student's first name as it appears on their official school record.

- Your student's results from Fall 2020 through present
- Your student's Individual Student Reports with interpretative guides.
- Glossary
- FAQs
- Performance Levels

Where do I get the Access Code?

The code can be found in the Home Access Center (HAC) under the Registration tab. The code will be located on the right side of the page under Additional Information.






How Do I Get Approved to Access the School Building?

In an ongoing endeavor to provide safety and security for students and staff, school access is required for every individual that is not a staff member of the St. Johns County School District. Below are the steps every visitor must complete to access the building during school hours.

1. Complete the School Access Form at https://stjohns.keepntrack.com/apply. Do not wait to complete your application because the process can potentially take up to two weeks to clear.



- 2. Bring your ID when you check in at the front office.
- Proper identification must be presented each time a person signs in at a school. The only forms of proper identification are the following:
 - Current state issued driver's license
 - Current state issued identification card (issued only by the DMV)
- If a person has a visa and/or does not have a social security number, the applicant must contact the Volunteer Services department (547-3952) right away for alternate steps.
- School access lasts for 3 year intervals. Upon approaching 3 years of access, it is the
 responsibility of the applicant to contact Volunteer Services and renew the form. To
 reduce duplication, do not complete a new form.

The primary responsibility for a student's attire resides with the student and their parent/guardian. The St. Johns County School District expects students to dress in a way that is appropriate for the school day or any school sponsored event. Student dress code requirements reflect fair, equitable, and consistent practices for all students, while contributing to a safe and positive school climate.

In accordance with statutory requirement F.S. 1006.07 (students are prohibited from wearing clothing that exposes underwear or that exposes body parts in an indecent or vulgar manner) enforcement will focus on positive guidance without embarrassment to the student and should not disrupt the educational process.

All Students

- Personal attire may be in the style of the day. Clothing, piercings, and
 accessories displaying profanity, violence, discriminatory messages, sexually suggestive phrases,
 phrases or symbols of alcohol, tobacco or drugs is unacceptable.
- Gang graffiti will not be drawn or worn on backpacks, notebooks, folders, papers, clothing or any
 other object or on the body of any student or person on school property.
- Pajamas shall not be worn as exterior clothing on campus.
- Head gear, including but not limited to, caps, hats, bandanas and/or sunglasses shall not be
 worn indoors on campus unless permitted by school administration for religious or medical
 reasons. Students may wear sunglasses, hats, or other sun protective wear while outdoors.
- Clothing must cover areas from one armpit to the other armpit, down to the midthigh. Tops must have shoulder straps and be long enough to adequately cover the waistline and not expose the midriff.
- Students must wear shoes that are safe and appropriate for the learning environment. Middle school and elementary school students must wear shoes that have a back or strap on the heel. High school students may wear backless shoes. Bedroom slippers are prohibited.
- Seethrough or mesh garments must be worn with opaque clothing over it or underneath that meets the standard for clothing coverage.
- Rips or tears in clothing above the midthigh must not expose skin.

Physical Activities

It is highly recommended that every student wear socks and sneakers to school. Students will participate in some type of physical activity daily. Water bottles, hats, and sunscreen are always recommended for outside activities. Sunscreen must be applied at home.
